



Elk (Wapiti)



Height:

about 1.5 m at shoulders

Weight:

Adult males about 450 kilos; females about 230 kilos

Antler length: up to 1.5 metres (from point to point)

Lifespan:

Up to 15 years, 25 years in game reserve

Females live in herds, calves are spotted.

Diet: grass, leaves, chestnuts, fruit, tree sprouts, moss,

The elk is of great importance to American Natives. Medicine Men often carry the elk in their name.



Canada Goose



Body length:

up to 1 metre

Weight:

about 6.5 kilos

Wingspan: up to 1.7

metres

Lifespan:

Up to 10 years, 33 years (record!) in game reserve

During the night they stay in the water and fly in the morning and evening hours in V-flight formation.

Diet: grass, marsh- and water plants

Canada geese mate for life, 5 to 6 eggs per nest.



Salmon



Size:

up to 1 metre

Weight:

Up to 25 kg

Lifespan:

4 to 6 years

Migratory fish

- 1) Salmon migrate from salt water to lay their eggs upstream in freshwater rivers. They leap up waterfalls or swim through fish ladders.
- 2) Young salmon grow up in freshwater and then migrate to the sea (takes up to three years).
- 3) They stay in the ocean (salt water) for 2 to 4 years. Then they migrate back to the freshwater rivers where they were born.



Skunk



Size:

head and body up to 50 centimetres, tail up to 40 centimetres

Weight:

Up to 4,5 kg

Lifespan:

5 to 6 years

Predator, eats plants and meat (=omnivore).

Black and white fur

Habitat: Skunks live in dens. They usually live alone and sleep during the winter.

When a skunk is attacked it can spray a very foul-smelling liquid on the attacker.



Height:

about 1,5 m at shoulders

Weight:

Adult males about 500 kilos; females about 200 kilos

Top speed:

50 km per hour

Lifespan:

20 - 25 years

The Grizzly Bear

The grizzly bear is a large predator.


Grizzly bears eat both plants and animals. They like roots, berries, insects, fish and small and large mammals.

Grizzly bears need to eat a lot in the summer and autumn in order to build up fat reserves for the winter period. They hibernate during the winter for 5-8 months.

Grizzly bears can smell food from miles away.

Grizzly bears live solitary lives.
